
Common Beliefs Survey

 The Common Beliefs Survey was sent out to 80 high school teachers in the Streetsboro City School District.


 45 out of 80 surveys were completed giving us a 54% return rate.

Q1. I don't think of my students in terms of race or ethnicity. I am color blind when it comes to my teaching.




Mean Rating: 3.87

Q2. The gap in the achievement among students of different races is about poverty, not race.




Mean Rating: 3.78

Q3. Teachers should adapt their teaching to the distinctive cultures of African American, Latino, Asian, and Native American students.




Mean Rating: 3.4

Q4. In some cultures, students are embarrassed to speak in front of others so I take this into account and don't call on these students in class.




Mean Rating: 3.1

- We need to create a trusting environment



Q6. It is not fair to ask students who are struggling with English to take on challenging academic assignments.



- Never underestimate a child's ability


Q7. I believe that I should reward students who try hard, even if they are not doing well in school; building their self-esteem is important.

Q8. I try to keep in mind the limits of my students' ability and give them assignments that I know they can do so that they do not become discouraged.




Mean Rating: 3.4

- Small achievable goals provides for long term success


Q9. Students of different races and ethnicities often have different learning styles and good teachers will match their instruction to these learning styles.

Q10. Grouping students of different levels of achievement for instruction may benefit some students, but it can undermine the progress that could otherwise be made by higher achieving students.



Q11. Before students are asked to engage in complex learning tasks, they need to have a solid grasp of basic skills.




Mean Rating: 4.0



- Q9. Overall teachers agree that differentiated instruction is necessary in order to accommodate various learning styles (64%).
